



RULES FOR THE FLOWER SHOW

- Any garden produce offered for competition must have been grown by the exhibitor in his/her own garden or allotment.
- 2. The Pot Plant must have been in the possession of the exhibitor for not less than three months
- 3. That, if any exhibitor shows as his/her own, any produce not grown by himself/ herself, or uses any means to deceive the Judges, the Committee shall have the power to exclude him/her from exhibiting at any future time. The Committee reserves the right to inspect any garden or allotment before awarding prize.
- 4. Horticultural exhibits must be at the Show between 8.00am and 10.00am on the day of the Show. No late entries accepted. Cup presentation at 4pm. Exhibits to be collected after Cup presentation.
- Exhibitors must bring their exhibits in their own dishes or baskets, roots must be clean except where otherwise stated, and in a fit state for exhibition.
- No exhibitor may win more than one prize in any one Class. The Judges will take into consideration the quality rather than the size of the exhibits.
- It will be left entirely to the decision of the Judges to grant extra prizes as they think fit.
- The Committee will not, under any circumstances, be responsible for any loss, damage, or non-delivery of any article exhibited at the Show, but will take all reasonable care.
- 9. Unless there are four exhibits in the Class, Judges will use their discretion as to whether to award a third prize.
- 10. Any question of status to be determined by Committee
- 11. All carrots, Beet, Turnip tops, etc. to be NO MORE THAN 4" IN LENGTH

RECIPE FOR CHOCOLATE AND WALNUT SANDWICH CAKE (class 45)

I5 oz plain flour 4 oz golden syrup ¼ pint milk 1tsp bicarb soda 4 oz margarine 1 egg 2 oz cocoa

Filling

4 oz unsalted butter

3 oz icing sugar

1 lvl dsp cocoa

Vanilla essence

1 oz chopped walnuts

1 tsp instant coffee

Melted chocolate and a few walnuts to decorate

Oven temp 190C/Gas5 Cooking time 20-30 minutes Tin size 7 inch

Grease and line two sandwich tins. Sieve flour and cocoa. Place syrup, sugar and butter in a pan and stir over gentle heat. Remove and when cool add milk, bicarbonate of soda and beaten egg. Stir thoroughly into flour, and continue to stir until mixture is quite smooth. Divide mixture between two tins and bake in a hot oven. Then cool on a wire tray and remove paper. For the feeling, cream butter, icing sugar, cocoa and coffee, beat well add a drop of vanilla essence and chopped walnuts. Sandwich cake together, spread melted chocolate on top and decorate with few walnuts.







RECIPE FOR VEGAN BANANA BREAD (class 46)

3 large black bananas 100 g brown sugar 3 heaped tsp of baking powder 50g of dried fruit 75ml vegetable or sunflower oil 225g plain flour 3 tsp mixed spice

Preheat oven 200C/Gas 6 2lb loaf tin Baking time 40 minutes

Mash bananas and mix with oil and sugar. Add flour, baking powder, spices and mix together. Add fruit.

Pour into oiled and lined tin and bake for 20 minutes. Cover with foil and bake for further 20 minutes. Test with clean skewer. Allow to cool before turning on to a wire rack. Exhibit whole.
